

Assemble Message Centre Guidance for Volunteers

What is the Assemble Message Centre?


The Assemble Message Centre gives you the opportunity to connect with other CHSS volunteers, colleagues and your line manager. The message centre in Assemble does not share your email address, phone number or any other personal data.

What is the Assemble Volunteer Directory?

Access to the Assemble Volunteer Directory is dependent on your volunteer role.

If you do have access, the Assemble Volunteer Directory gives you the opportunity to message other volunteers who are in your team. The directory lists other volunteers in your team as well as CHSS colleagues and gives you the option to send them a message.

There is the option to remove yourself from the volunteer directory. You can do this via your Assemble profile and navigating to the contacts tab. Here you can edit your contact preferences and remove yourself from the volunteer directory. By removing yourself from the directory, other volunteers will not be able to message you via the directory.

Using the Assemble Message Centre

Do:	Do not:
Use the Assemble message centre to connect with CHSS volunteers within your team, CHSS colleagues and your volunteer line manager about your volunteer role.	Send abusive or harmful messages.
Communicate with your volunteer line manager via the Assemble message centre to share information relating to your volunteer role. For example, letting your volunteer line manager know you are available to volunteer or if there are any changes to when you can volunteer.	Share service user information.
Report any concerns to your volunteer line manager, the CHSS Safeguarding Team or the CHSS Volunteering Team.	Share inappropriate or confidential information, 'memes' or anything which could be considered offensive or political. If you wish to discuss personal information, please speak with your volunteer line manager.
Please contact your volunteer line manager or the Volunteering Team immediately if you receive an inappropriate message.	Ignore signs of bullying, grooming or any other inappropriate behaviour.
